UK garden tours generally depart from London, with additional pick-ups depending on the route of the coach, while tours in Scotland depart from Glasgow, Edinburgh and Perth, with Dundee, Inverness and Aberdeen sometimes added (see website for full pick-up points for all tours). All Eurostar tours depart from London St. Pancras. Flight-inclusive tours depart from one or more of the main London airports, with regional flights often available at a supplement.

UK regional airports offer a wide range of domestic flights with low-cost airlines to the main airports, while the national rail network offers frequent nationwide services, so do ask us to quote for connecting travel. 

During this holiday, we will also visit the gardens of Trentham Estate in Staffordshire, the gardens at Dunham Massey, Arley Hall and Tatton Park, which retain much of their Edwardian character.

Irish Rover

This charming eight-day holiday includes some special highlights, such as a meeting with Helen Dillon, the doyenne of Irish gardeners, at her new private garden in Dublin, at which we are granted privileged access. We will also meet June Blake, a passionate plantswoman who grows a unique mix of bamboos, ornamental grasses and perennials, and her brother Jimi Blake at Hunting Brook, with its fusion of prairie and tropical planting.

There will be a stop at the dazzling and idiosyncratic garden of Mount Stewart, truly one of the great gardens of the world; we will call in at the Blarney Castle and Gardens, which is perhaps most famous for its stone – which legend tells has the power of conferring eloquence on all who kiss it; and there will be a visit to Malahide Castle, one of the oldest and most historic castles in all of Ireland.

We also visit Castle Ward, Powerscourt, Ilnacullin, Mount Usher and Rowallane! As you can see, our north to south journey is packed full of gems, yet is relaxed and unhurried, taking in the very best that the beautiful Emerald Isle has to offer.





Highlights of Orkney & Shetland

After having spent much of 2020 unable to travel, they can't wait to get back out there and take you on some memorable trips now that holidays will be starting up again.

Our Tour Managers range from a former Head Gardener to HM The Queen Mother to an award-winning garden designer and broadcaster, and we even have a few archaeologists and historians among us!

They take pride in the holidays they lead, sharing facts and stories along the way, and four of our Tour Managers leading 2021 departures told us about the trips they're most looking forward to leading this year.

Peter Yeoman chose to talk about his historical In the Footsteps of the Picts holiday, which goes in search of this mysterious civilisation from Scotland's North. Trevor Edwards shared some thoughts on our popular Irish Rover tour, which showcases some of Ireland's most

glorious gardens. Colin Crosbie has revealed the delights to be found on the island of Jersey, which we visit on our beautiful Gardens of Jersey holiday, and Alastair Walker chose our best-selling Grand Tour of the Outer Hebrides, an all-encompassing break that needs no introduction.





Island-hopping through the Outer Hebrides is always a pleasure, and the Grand Tour is a great way to do so. We get around by

coach and by Caledonian MacBrayne's ferry service. There are five crossings required, two in large deep-sea ferries to cross the Minch, and then three on much smaller ferries where one really has the opportunity to get on deck, savour the sea breezes, look out for seals and cetaceans, and watch gannets diving for their supper.

Stornoway, the only town of any size, acts as a magnet with the attraction of some of the Lewis Chessmen on display in Lews Castle museum, and Callanish, a Neolithic site in west Lewis, is every bit as spectacular as Stonehenge. Crofting townships survive and the thatched Blackhouse village of Gearrannan affords a peat-tinged glimpse into how our forebears lived until well into the 20th century. Further south, the Uist archipelago is now connected internally by causeways that link the six islands through which we pass. Quite idyllic.



Garden.

I may be biased, but it is my opinion that the British Isles and Channel Islands are home to some of the world's finest, most inspirational and

diverse gardens. The gardens of Jersey benefit from the island's unique wonderfully mild and sunny climate. We will see a wide range of plants from quite literally all over the world, which give the gardens an exotic and unique feel. I am looking forward to visiting the garden at Creux Baillot with its incredible plant collection and reacquainting myself with the Japanese garden at Samarès Botanical

The Eric Young Orchid Foundation, which we will visit as part of this holiday, is a centre of excellence for orchid cultivation and I have always been inspired by their outstanding gold medal-winning displays at RHS Chelsea Flower Shows. This is a trip that will enthral us with its diversity of plants, with the creative and imaginative way they have been used, and – of course – the beautiful sea views for which Jersey is so rightly famous.



I look forward to and enjoy on every occasion. Apart from the many varied gardens experiences, this tour is

a great introduction to the island of Ireland and our travels will expose you to the beauty of the unique landscape. Starting in Northern Ireland, we visit many interesting gardens, not least of all being the National Trust's jewel that is Mount Stewart House and Garden. We usually manage to find time to include a coach tour of the City of Belfast, and I love to share the ancient and recent history of the city and the Province of Ulster.

Usually, our final visit in the Dublin area before heading further south is to Mount Usher, one of my favourite Irish gardens and ranked by Monty Don as one of the ten great gardens of the world. The journey to Cork is another scenic delight. The highlights of the southern part of the tour will undoubtedly be our visit to the Ilnacullin Garden on Garnish Island and to Blarney Castle Gardens.



The tribes of Scotland north of the Forth were dubbed Picts by the Romans from around 200 AD – painted people, a name maybe based on

their tattoos. These peoples developed a common Pictish culture and became Christians, their chief legacy being an incredible body of sophisticated stone sculpture, often expressing messages in a visual language. They helped forge the nation that we now call Scotland. The Picts have been seen as mysterious, although this myth has now been debunked by current archaeological investigations, revealing extraordinary new evidence of Pictish life, beliefs, forts and way of life.

Against this backdrop, I decided that Brightwater guests would enjoy sharing an exploration of the southern Picts' homeland in the rich farmland of Perth and Angus, and so created this tour. Within just a few days, we visit some of their key places, starting with a special curator-led tour of the spectacular Pictish collections in the Museum of Scotland in Edinburgh.

A Historic Season-Swap

For the very first time in its 108-year history, the world-famous RHS Chelsea Flower Show will take place in the autumn due to the pandemic. Not only is the timing of the 2021 Chelsea Flower Show unique, now taking place between the 21st and 26th September, it is also expected to inspire wonderful new autumnal displays. Seasonal highlights will include Salvias, Asters, Dahlias, grasses, fruit and, of course, the humble vegetable. Its location won't be changing, however, and it will continue to be held at London's Royal Hospital Chelsea, unmoved since 1913.

There have been a few events throughout the flower show's history that are noteworthy and these include being cancelled for the duration of World War One along with stopping from 1939 to 1947 because of World War Two. In 1932, the show was hit with such aggressive rain that a summer house display fell to pieces and the very first iteration of the event, which took place in 1804, was actually called 'The Great Spring Show'.

One of our Tour Managers, Trevor Edwards, is particularly excited by the change of date, telling us: "I have visited the RHS Chelsea Flower Show for more years that I can remember. For those who have never visited the world's best-known flower show, prepare yourself for an experience of a lifetime! 
A GRAND TOUR OF THE OUTER HEBRIDES

ur extended tour of the Hebrides has proved extremely popular, offering as it does a unique opportunity to travel the length and breadth of the Western Isles. Our Grand Tour takes in all the beauty and diversity of this very special environment with 10 different islands and four ferry trips included. Two comfortable hotels ensure that this holiday is as relaxing as possible, while at the same time offering great variety.

We take the ferry from Mallaig to Lochboisdale in South Uist and continue to our hotel in Benbecula. We visit the islands of Eriskay; Vatersay with its fantastic sandy beaches and Barra, where visits include Kisimul Castle and Cockleshell Beach, with the latter being used as the island's airport. A captivating journey follows as we travel north by ferry from North Uist and on through the magnificent mountain scenery of Harris and the rolling moorland of Lewis to Stornoway. We continue with visits to the remarkable Standing Stones of Callanish, the tranquil little Norse Mill at Shawbost and the distinctive Black Houses at Gearrannan. Our return route takes us by ferry from Stornoway to Ullapool.





Your Itinerary

Day 1 We depart from our designated pick up points and head to Mallaig, stopping en route for refreshments. We catch a ferry to **Lochboisdale** in South Uist and enjoy dinner on board. Upon arrival, we continue over causeways until we arrive in Benbecula. (D)

Day 2 After breakfast we head for Barra, travelling via the little island of **Eriskay**. Upon arrival in **Barra**, we enjoy a tour of the island, including a visit by boat to **Kisimul Castle**. Next, we visit **Cockleshell Beach**, the unique airport runway whose use is governed by the tides. Finally, we visit **Vatersay**, by the causeway which links the two islands. In the course of our tour today, we hope to see many species of wildflowers. (B & D)

Day 3 We check out of our hotel and take the ferry from Berneray to Leverburgh, located on the Isle of Harris. Upon arrival, we visit **St. Clement's Church** at Rodel. The tombs here are among the most spectacular in Scotland. Next, we travel along the coast to the rolling moorland of **Lewis**, continuing to our hotel in Stornoway. (B & D)


Day 4 This morning after breakfast we travel to the west coast of Lewis for a visit to the 5,000-year-old **Standing Stones** of **Callanish**. Undoubtedly the most remarkable antiquity in the Western Isles, this collection of almost 50 stones forms a well-marked megalithic avenue. From here, we move on to the **Black Houses** at **Gearrannan**, typical of the crofting settlements, which, until relatively recently, were found throughout the Western Isles. The final visit on our circular tour is to the **Norse Mill** at Shawbost, a reconstruction of the type of building used by Viking settlers. (B & D)

Day 5 Today we visit Lews Castle and Museum, where we can meet the famous Lewis Chessmen and view the Outer Hebrides as never before in a wrap-around audio-visual presentation. This afternoon we visit St. Columba's Ui Church, one of the most important archaeological sites on the island. We will also see the Port of Ness and the Butt of Lewis, home to the unique Stevenson Lighthouse. (B & D)

Day 6 This morning we check out of the hotel and take the early morning ferry from Stornoway to Ullapool (breakfast will be served on board), before continuing to our original pick-up points. (\mathbb{B})

GRAND TOUR OF THE INNER HEBRIDES



Omplementing our Grand Tour of the Outer Hebrides (see pages 14-15), this equally grand yet relaxing tour takes in the principal Inner Hebridean isles of Mull, Islay and Jura as well as the famous little island gems of Staffa and Iona.

We begin on the Isle of Mull with a visit to the colourful 'capital' of Tobermory, followed by an exciting boat trip to the tiny island of Staffa and its famous Fingal's Cave, an amazing natural cathedral of basalt columns. A full day is spent visiting the wonderfully peaceful island of lona with its famous abbey and beautiful beaches, a place of undeniable calm and contemplation, along with Duart Castle, which enjoys superb views over the Firth of Lorne and the surrounding mountains. We drive south through the ancient kingdom of Dalriada to Kennacraig, where we catch the Caledonian MacBrayne ferry to Islay. We will explore the island with visits to historic Loch Finlaggan and the Museum of Islay Life, as well as a tour and tasting at the Bowmore Distillery, one of nine distilleries on the island. We will also visit Jura, Islay's sparsely populated and rather mysterious neighbour, a naturalist's paradise dominated by three majestic mountains.





Your Itinerary

Day 1 We depart from our designated pick-up points and head for the Western Highlands. On arrival in Oban we take a ferry to **Craignure** on the island of Mull. Our base is the Isle of Mull Hotel & Spa, conveniently located close to the ferry terminal with superb views of the Morvern Hills and Duart Castle. The hotel offers excellent spa and leisure facilities, including an indoor swimming pool and steam room.

Day 2 After breakfast we depart for **Tobermory**, the island's 'capital' and whose colourful buildings lining the waterfront will be familiar from a hundred calendars. This is the starting point for our cruise to the little island of **Staffa** and the **Treshnish Isles**, during which we hope to see whales, dolphins, basking sharks, various seabirds and sea eagles. We sail first to Staffa, where we hope to have time ashore to explore **Fingal's Cave**, one of the wonders of the west coast. We continue to the **Treshnish Isles** and observe the wildlife, which in the summer months includes puffins. (B, L & D)

Day 3 We cross as foot passengers to the Isle of Iona. Here, we have the opportunity to visit the abbey and wander over the island, taking in the atmosphere of calm and contemplation, which attracts visitors from all over the world. In the afternoon we visit **Duart Castle**, the 13th century home of the Chief of Clan MacLean. We explore the dungeons, the state rooms and appreciate the strategic position of the castle from the top of the keep. ($\beta \& D$)

Day 4 Following breakfast we catch the ferry back to Oban then drive south to Kennacraig where we catch the ferry to **Port Askaig.** Our hotel is conveniently located next to the harbour. ($\beta \& D$)

Day 5 This morning, following breakfast, our first visit will be to Loch Finlaggan, which was once the centre of the 'Lordship of the Isles'. We continue to Bowmore Distillery, which is the oldest distillery on the island and has stood on the shores of Loch Indaal since 1779. It's here we will see how this unique whisky is produced by hand, before maturing in Spanish and American oak casks. Later, we transfer to Port Charlotte on the other side of Loch Indaal for a visit to the Museum of Islay Life. The museum was established in 1976 and is housed in the former Free Church in Port Charlotte. Since then, it has built up a main collection of over 2,700 objects, including stone implements used in the Mesolithic era. (B & D)

Day 6 This morning, we travel to the neighbouring island of Jura, an island which has a record of habitation stretching back over 5,000 years. The island, with approximately 200 inhabitants, is 30 miles long and seven miles wide and is a naturalist's paradise. It is dominated by the three mountains known as the "Paps of Jura", the highest being 2,576ft. The northern end of the island was home to George Orwell, who wrote his masterpiece "1984" while living here at Barnhill. We enjoy a scenic tour before having some free time in **Craighouse**, a lovely little village and the main settlement on the island with a shop and tearoom. (B & D)

Day 7 After breakfast, we check out of the hotel and take the morning ferry to **Kennacraig** on the mainland. We continue our homeward journey, stopping en route in **Inveraray**, before returning to our original pick-up points. (B)



HIGHLIGHTS OF ORKNEY & SHETLAND

THE 'ISLANDS OF THE SIMMER DIM'



ail away to lands steeped in history, wildlife and stunning scenery – the Orkney and Shetland isles. Many people have landed there before us, some as early as 3,000 BC. Most famous of all were the Vikings, but they were not alone and all around you historical treasures can be found. Both Orkney and Shetland have their own identities. Orkney is green and fertile, while Shetland has rugged cliff and sea loch landscapes. However, both share a colourful history of Picts, Norsemen, ancient antiquities and seafaring legends – bound together with an independent spirit that sets them apart from the rest of Scotland. We sail with Serco Northlink Ferries aboard their modern, purpose-built vessels overnight from Aberdeen to Lerwick, and then there are two full days to tour Shetland. After rejoining the ship for an evening sailing to Kirkwall, we have two days to explore Orkney.





Your Itinerary

Day 1 We depart from our designated departure points and travel to Aberdeen. We take the overnight ferry to **Lerwick** and once on board, we shall check in to our comfortable twin-berth cabins, which all have en-suite facilities. The ship has a delightful restaurant, where dinner is served this evening. (D)

Day 2 After breakfast, we leave the ship and commence our tour of Shetland. Our first stop is **Scalloway**, where we visit the ruined castle built in 1600 by the infamous Earl Patrick Stewart. We then continue north to the spectacular cliffs of **Eshaness**. Look out for the 'Otters Crossing' sign and indeed the otters themselves at the narrow isthmus known as Mavis Grind, where it is said to be possible to throw a stone from the North Sea to the Atlantic Ocean. From here, we transfer to our accommodation at the historic and characterful Busta House Hotel. (B & D)

Day 3 Today we start with a visit to the outstanding Prehistoric and Norse Settlement of Jarlshof, with over three acres of remains, spanning 3,000 years since the days of the Stone Age, including oval-shaped Bronze Age houses, an Iron Age broch and wheel houses. From here, we travel to nearby Sumburgh Head and visit the **RSPB reserve**, home to thousands of seabirds including puffins (May-Aug), guillemots and razorbills. This afternoon we travel through small communities before we have free time in the island's capital of Lerwick and an opportunity to visit the state of the art Shetland Museum. This evening, we rejoin our ship and sail south to Orkney. Dinner is served on board and upon arrival in Orkney we transfer to our hotel. (B & D)

Day 4 We have a full day excursion around mainland Orkney, visiting its many archaeological sites including the great stone circles of Brodgar and Stenness, which lie to the north side of the Orphir Hills. To this day, the monuments' ages remain uncertain. We then continue to Maeshowe, the finest chambered tomb in Western Europe. Built before 2,700 BC, Maeshowe was raided by the Vikings in the 12th century, and it houses the largest collections of runic inscriptions to be found in any one place in the world. A visit to Skara Brae is also included, with its new visitor centre depicting the history of this world-famous monument. (B & D)

Day 5 This morning, we have free time to explore Kirkwall at leisure. Places of interest include St. Magnus Cathedral, one of Europe's greatest architectural masterpieces with its red and yellow sandstone still vibrant after 861 years, and the adjacent Bishop's Palace. In the afternoon, we depart on a tour of the south end of mainland Orkney, crossing the Churchill Barriers, which were built after the sinking of HMS Royal Oak in October 1939. We also stop off at the beautiful Italian Chapel, built on the site of a former prisoner of war camp. The marvellous paintings in the interior were done by one of the prisoners who returned several times to restore and repaint parts of the building. (B & D)

Day 6 After breakfast, we check out of the hotel and transfer to St. Margaret's Hope to catch the Pentland Ferries sailing to Gills Bay. We then return to our original pick-up points. (B)

orkney is an archipelago of 70 islands, each with their own distinctive charm, history and natural beauty. Day 4 A full day exploring mainland Orkney awaits, as we visit the archaeological sites of Maeshowe, Skara Brae and the Standing Stones of Stenness. After an opportunity to explore the local Museum and Arts Centre, we visit the Highland Park Distillery for a behind the scenes tour and a warming dram. (B & D)

Day 5 We catch the ferry back to the mainland and visit the **Timespan Museum and Arts Centre** in Helmsdale before continuing home. (B)

UP HELLY AA SHETLAND'S FIRE FESTIVAL

W ander through the streets of Lerwick at the end of January and it's likely to be nothing short of a unique experience. Squads of bearded Vikings kitted out in chainmail and winged helmets can be seen carrying a 30ft longship, which is fated to be ceremoniously set alight. This is Up Helly Aa, the annual winter festival of Shetland – it's run by Shetlanders for Shetlanders, but visitors are always welcome.

KNITTING IN THE SHETLAND ISLES

Five those who think they know all there is to know about the art of knitting can pick up a thing or two in the scenic Shetland Isles, and we're not just talking about those pesky dropped stitches! There are workshops aplenty, both starting off our mornings and rounding off our afternoons. These present the perfect opportunity to hone our skills — and perhaps even learn some new ones — under the watchful eye of experienced local tutors. We also visit local textile galleries and studios and take in some of the stunning sights of the island.

Your Itinerary

Day 1 Departing by coach from our pick up points, we travel to Aberdeen for our overnight sailing to Shetland. Dinner is served on board. (\square)

Day 2 Disembark at Lerwick, travelling to the Prehistoric and Norse Settlement of Jarlshof. We stop at Sumburgh Head, Lerwick's Textile Gallery of the Shetland Museum and Archives, and finally the Shetland Textile Museum. ($\mathbb{B} \& \mathbb{D}$)

Day 3 Today is the first of our **knitting** workshops, where we learn about Shetland hand-knitting. After lunch, we visit the **Nielanell Design Studio** and **Hoswick Visitor Centre**. (B, L & D)



AN ARCHAEOLOGIST'S VIEW OF ORKNEY AND SHETLAND

The islands of Orkney and Shetland are littered with archaeological remains. People first came here over 5,000 years ago and many of their remains survive. Research is ongoing here and excavations by archaeologists continue to uncover new information. The islands are therefore of enormous interest to anyone who enjoys first-hand contact with ancient settlements and buildings as well as the people who once lived here.

During our time on Shetland we will visit the uninhabited island of Mousa with its 2,000-year-old full size broch, the Prehistoric and Norse Settlement of Jarlshof, St. Ninian's Isle with its 6th century church, and the ruined castle of Scalloway. We then travel to Orkney where we visit the Italian Chapel; the Tomb of the Eagles, which offers a unique 'hands-on' experience - an opportunity to handle 5,000-year old artefacts excavated from an extensive cliff-top site; Maeshowe, the finest chambered tomb in Western Europe; and Skara Brae as well as Skaill House. En route to Aberdeen, we will stop for a photo opportunity at Dunnottar Castle, a cliff-top fortress dating back to the 3rd century.

Day 1 We depart for Aberdeen, with a photo stop en route at **Dunnottar Castle**, and take the overnight ferry to Lerwick. (D)

Day 2 We begin our exploration of Shetland with a visit to the Iron Age broch on the little island of **Mousa**. Later we tour the outstanding Prehistoric and Norse Settlement of **Jarlshof**, spanning 3,000 years of human habitation. (B & D)

Day 3 Visit the 6th century church at St Ninian's Isle, Scalloway Castle and Tingwall Valley, before taking the evening sailing to Kirkwall. ($\mathbb{B} \otimes \mathbb{D}$)

IN THE FOOTSTEPS OF THE PICTS

iving beyond the northern frontier of the Roman Empire, the people of northern Scotland in the Dark Ages were known as the Picts – a name given by the Romans meaning the 'painted, tattooed ones'. They were renowned as one of the most warlike of the Celtic barbarian tribes of Europe, successfully attacking the Roman army, and yet few of their homes or forts have ever been found. They did, however, leave behind some of the finest carved stones and jewellery from early medieval Europe.

During this tour, we will travel through the heartland of the southern Picts in Perthshire and Angus, tracking down these elusive people and coming face to face with them through the clues of their everyday life as seen in the incredible artistry of their monumental stone sculpture.

We then travel to Brechin to view the medieval round tower and adjacent cathedral, and we visit nearby Aberlemno with its four magnificent Pictish stones. Day 3 We head to **Dunkeld** to visit the **Pictish hillfort**, and then on to the attractive village of **Dunning**, where we visit the **Pictish monastery**. We then travel to **Forteviot**, the royal centre of Pictish kings, and finally explore **Perth Museum**, viewing its fine displays and collections. (B & D)

Day 4 We drive to **St. Andrews** this morning to see the decorated stone sarcophagus of a great Pictish king before travelling by boat (weather permitting) to visit the monastery on the **Isle of May**, a National Nature Reserve. We return to our original pick-up points. (B)

ANCIENT STONES OF THE OUTER HEBRIDES

£695 n about 1800 BC, at around the time that the Middle Kingdom of Ancient Egypt was flourishing, an equally vigorous civilisation was leaving its mark on the far-flung islands of the Outer Hebrides. The Standing Stones at Callanish, tall and slender slabs of silvery Lewisian gneiss, are the enduring testament to the skill and knowledge of a long vanished and mysterious community, who laid out these stones according to precise astronomical observations, lining up the main avenue with the point at which the full moon of midsummer sets. Later settlers have left their mark too, and the tranquil islands of Lewis and Harris are blessed with an abundance of archaeological remains. Neolithic cairns, Bronze Age standing stones, Iron Age houses, Norse mills and Blackhouses from a couple of centuries ago - the islands are a living timeline and a paradise for the amateur archaeologist. In the company of local specialist guide Carol Knott, we will tour a succession of sites, from the rolling moorlands and sweeping beaches of Lewis in the north to the dramatic mountains of Harris in the south.

From here, we travel to the west coast of Lewis for a visit to the 5,000 year old **Standing Stones of Callanish**, undoubtedly the most remarkable antiquity in the Western Isles; **St Columba's Ui Church**, one of the most important archaeological sites on Lewis, and finally **Lews Castle**. Day 3 We travel south to Harris, where we visit St Clement's Church, whose tombs are among the most spectacular in Scotland; the Genealogy Centre at Northton and the ancient standing stone known as Clach Mhic Leoid. (B & D)

Day 4 Today our visits include the exceptionally well preserved Carloway Broch; the Black Houses at Gearrannan and Arnol, the recreated Norse Mill at Shawbost and the standing stone Clach an Trushal, which at over 6m is one of the tallest in Scotland. (B $\&\, D)$

Day 5 We take the ferry from Stornoway to Ullapool and return to our original departure points. (\mathbb{B})

AUTUMN TINTS OF PERTHSHIRE

The Gaelic-speaking culture adds another layer of interest here.



Day 1 Drive to Mallaig and take the evening ferry to Lochboisdale in South Uist, with dinner available on board (not included). On arrival, continue over the causeways that link the islands to Benbecula and the Dark Island Hotel, your base for the next two nights

Day 2 Take the ferry from Eriskay to Barra and tour the island. Suggested visits include Kisimul Castle, the neighbouring island of Vatersay and the unique airport at Cockleshell Beach. Day 3 Take the morning ferry from Berneray to Leverburgh on Harris and after a visit to St. Clement's Church at Rodel, drive over a spectacular mountain pass and on to Stornoway, where you will spend the next three nights.



ORKNEY'S GARDEN TRAIL

6 DAYS FROM £1175

Isles in particular are more about mountains and moorlands, crashing waves and high seaside cliffs than a picture of manicured gardens. Well of course it is all about wild landscapes, however it is also home to a collection of very determined gardeners who have created, in some cases over generations, a collection of excellent gardens, set amidst a beautiful landscape of long summer days and evenings when it hardly gets dark – a twilight that is known as the 'simmer dim'.

We begin in Caithness and Sutherland, with visits to the Castle of Mey and other gardens before crossing the Pentland Firth to Orkney. GARDENS OF

DUMFRIES AND GALLOWAY

In the south-western corner of Scotland, Dumfries and Galloway is home to some of the country's most attractive gardens. The artistic highlight of our tour is undoubtedly Dumfries House, actually in Ayrshire and which Prince Charles helped to save. One of the Adam Brothers' finest achievements, the stunning interiors showcase a unique collection of Chippendale furniture, while the walled garden is one of the most exciting new garden developments in all of Scotland.

We see something rather different at Broughton House – an artist's garden at the restored former home of 'Glasgow Boy' E. A. Hornel, which shows the influence of his time in Japan and is always full of colour. Further highlights include Drumlanrig Castle, one of the most important Rennaissance buildings in Scotland, and Crawick Multiverse, a gem hidden among the rolling hills of Dumfriesshire.

Day 4 Art and horticulture are beautifully combined at **Drumlanrig Castle**, an imposing Rennaissance building that is home to outstanding paintings and furniture as well as grand Victorian gardens. Our final visit provides a contemporary contrast: Charles Jencks' **Crawick Multiverse**, a hidden gem nestled in the rolling hills. (B)

BEST OF

ANGUS GARDENS

The rich fertile soil of Angus provides an ideal environment for gardening, so it's no surprise that within this historic county in North-East Scotland there is a host of wonderful gardens to be enjoyed.

The House of Pitmuies, with its lavishly-planted herbaceous borders, is perhaps the star of the show. We visit splendid gardens at the castles of Edzell, Gardyne and Glamis as well as a selection of more homely private gardens.

Your Itinerary

Day 1 We depart from our designated pick up points this morning and head for our first visit, **Inchmill Cottage**, a long, sloping terraced garden 800 feet above sea level in the Braes of Angus. We then continue to our hotel in Montrose. (D)

Day 2 We visit the herbalist's gardens at Logie House, where the herbs are labelled with a brief description of their actions and uses. We continue to Glamis Castle, the childhood home of the late Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother, where there are superb displays of rhododendrons and azaleas in early summer and a delightful Italian garden. AYRSHIRE GARDENS

We visit grand properties such as Culzean Castle and Dumfries House, complemented by privately owned gardens such as Burnside and Barnweil.

Day 2 Carnell is our first port of call this morning, a well-known traditional walled garden with mature hedges, specimen trees and a lime avenue planted to commemorate a battle in 1743. Next we visit **Barnweil**, where an impressive and well-stocked garden has been created despite clay soil

and a northerly aspect, followed by **Blair House**, a 'sleeping beauty' of a garden which has been lovingly restored. A visit to **Holmes Farm Nursery** completes an enthralling day. (B & D)

Day 3 Today is free, alternatively join our optional excursion to the **Isle of Arran**, where we visit the attractive privately owned garden of **Dougarie** and historic **Brodick Castle and Gardens**, which enjoys fine views over the Firth of Clyde. ($\mathbb{B} \& \mathbb{D}$)

Day 4 Dumfries House is perhaps best known for its world-class furniture collection, but its walled garden is one of the best in Scotland, as is that at **Auchlochan**, with a mass of colour at every turn. (B)

HIGHLAND

WILDLIFE SAFARI

Cotland's natural environment is second to none with a more diverse range of habitats than almost any other country of comparable size.

We begin at the Loch of the Lowes Wildlife Reserve where, in addition to a pair of breeding ospreys, you may spot deer, otters, red squirrels and woodland birds. The Highland Wildlife Park's collection includes both native and non-native species, such as the snow leopard and polar bears.

It is hoped that on our boat trip on the Moray Firth we may see the resident pod of dolphins, while at the House of Aigas, we see a beaver dam and also visit the wildcat project.

We have a day among the majestic mountains of Wester Ross as we travel to Beinn Eighe National Nature Reserve and our tour concludes at the Fish Ladder at Pitlochry Dam, for a chance to see the mighty salmon making their way upstream.



Your Itinerary

Day 1 We depart for the **Loch of the Lowes Wildlife Reserve**, where the star attraction is a pair of breeding ospreys. We continue to the **Highland Wildlife Park**, near Aviemore, which has an extensive collection of both native and exotic animals, including polar bears and the snow leopard. (D)

Day 2 We take a boat trip on the Moray Firth, where we have an excellent chance of seeing bottlenose dolphins at close quarters as they feed among the tidal waters here. We continue to the House of Aigas Field Centre, where we have a guided walk around the estate to view the beaver dam and Scottish Wildcat project, followed by lunch using produce grown here on the estate. (B, $L \otimes D$)

Day 3 We travel through some glorious mountain scenery to Loch Maree, where we enjoy a gentle woodland walk at the Beinn Eighe National Nature Reserve. In the afternoon, we visit Inverewe Gardens, one of the finest gardens in the world with a host of botanical specimens, both native and exotic. (B & D)

Day 4 We visit the **Abernethy National Nature Reserve** at Loch Garten, where we hope to see a number of different birds, including the crested tit, crossbills and ospreys. Our final stop is at **Pitlochry Dam** and **Fish Ladder**, an opportunity to see salmon passing upstream on the River Tummel. (B)



A gentler pace is set as we sail 'Doon ra Watter' on the world's last seagoing paddle steamer, the PS Waverley*, still elegantly plying her trade on the Clyde. We also enjoy a relaxed and informative cruise on the calm waters of Loch Katrine amid the spectacular scenery of the Trossachs and a boat trip on the Falkirk Wheel, the world's first rotating boat lift and a modern engineering marvel. We offer two different packages for this tour in 2021, following the same itinerary: one staying at the Arrochar Hotel and one staying at the luxurious Stirling Highland Hotel.

Your Itinerary

Day 1 We depart from our pick-up points and travel to the **Falkirk Wheel**, the world's first rotating boat lift. Day 3 Today we enjoy our sail 'Doon ra Watter' on the world's last seagoing paddle steamer - **The Waverley**,* the last ocean-going paddle steamer plying its trade on the River Clyde. It was built in 1946 to replace the 1899 Waverley, which was sunk at Dunkirk, and is an extremely impressive sight with its immense 2,100 horsepower steam engine. We will leave the ship at Tighnabruaich and our coach will be waiting to take us back to the hotel, travelling over the "Rest and Be Thankful" and through stunning Argyll scenery. (B & D)

Day 4 Following breakfast we check out of the hotel and depart for a cruise on Loch Katrine, which serves as Glasgow's water supply and is also one of the most attractive fresh water lochs in Scotland, set amid the famed beauty of the Trossachs. Following our cruise, we continue by Aberfoyle, the Duke's Pass and Loch Venachar to Callander where we will have some free time before returning to our original departure points. (B)

SCENIC SCOTTISH RAILWAYS

The north of Scotland is blessed with some wonderfully scenic railway lines. The challenge of building railways through some of the most difficult terrain in the British Isles was taken up by the great engineers of the Victorian age. Their legacy is in the sweeping curves and majestic viaducts of the single-track lines, which cross wild moors and glens.

Using scheduled diesel train services, we will travel northwards to Wick, following the coast as far as Helmsdale, before sweeping inland through the wild and empty country of Sutherland and Caithness, and westwards to Kyle of Lochalsh, by Strath Bran and Strath Carron to the shores of Loch Alsh. We have the added attraction of steam haulage for our two other journeys, first on the Strathspey Railway and then on The Jacobite, which ensures that the haunting sound of a steam whistle continues to echo around Glenfinnan, as the train crosses 'Concrete Bob' McAlpine's magnificent viaduct on its way from Fort William to Mallaig.

Day 1 Depart from our chosen pick-up points and travel by coach to Aviemore and the **Strathspey Railway**, where our train of maroon-liveried coaches hauled by a lovingly restored steam locomotive will evoke memories of train journeys in the 1950s and 60s. 

One of the best is Plas Cadnant, which over 20 years ago was an overgrown, abandoned wilderness of ivy and decrepit fruit trees. Its new owner has brought it back to life and, rather like Heligan in Cornwall, Plas Cadnant has emerged as a gem of a garden, full of interest.

Further highlights include Plas yn Rhiw, a delightful manor house with an ornamental garden; Bodnant Garden, with a range of beautiful plants from all over the world; and Portmeirion, the eccentric and rather surreal Italianate village that has been enhanced in recent years with improvements made to the gardens.

Our tours are led by local resident **Tony Russell**, former Head Forester of Westonbirt Arboretum and a prolific author on trees and gardens.

Day 1 We depart by coach and head for Wales, where we visit the gardens of **Powis Castle**, influenced by French and Italian styles. We continue to our hotel. (D)

Day 2 Today we travel to the privately owned garden of Maenan Hall, a beautiful property set among mature hardwoods on the slopes of the Conwy Valley, with dramatic views of Snowdonia. In the afternoon, we travel to Colwyn Bay to visit Bodnant Garden and then we tour Plas Cadnant, a historic hidden garden which, much like Cornwall's Lost Gardens of Heligan, is slowly being uncovered and restored to its former glory. Day 3 Today we visit Mynydd Heulog, an 18th century stone cottage set in a sloping garden with amazing views over the bay. We then visit Plas yn Rhiw, a delightful manor house with an ornamental garden. (B & D)

Day 4 We visit the gardens at Plas Brondanw, followed by the famous village of Portmeirion – both created in a unique Italianate style by Sir Clough Williams-Ellis. Much work has been carried out in recent years to improve the gardens here, enhancing the beauty of the architecture. Following our visit here we return to our original departure points. (B)

GARDENS OF WEST WALES

Tucked away in the rolling countryside of Carmarthenshire and Pembrokeshire are some fine parks and gardens both large and small, ancient and modern. The centrepiece of our tour is the National Botanic Garden of Wales, a spectacular reinterpretation of the original garden that blends the careful restoration of the historic, double-walled garden with Norman Foster's Great Greenhouse, the largest single-span glasshouse in the world, where mere panes of glass separate the familiar green hills of Wales from a panoramic sweep of warm Mediterranean scenery.

Other visits include Aberglasney, which was discovered after 50 years of neglect and has been restored to produce a garden with immense appeal; Dyffryn Botanic Gardens, also recently restored to Thomas Mawson's original 1904 design; and two superb woodland gardens at Picton Castle and Upton Castle, along with Cae Hir, which has established itself as one of Wales' best loved gardens. A selection of interesting private gardens round off a captivating Cambrian campaign.

GARDENS OF NORTHUMBERLAND

The largely rural county of Northumberland is home to a range of individual and imaginative gardens, with each one giving an unusual insight into the pleasure of gardening in this most beautiful and tranquil corner of England.





urrently the largest gardening project in Europe, RHS Garden Bridgewater is due to open to the public in May 2021 and we are delighted to be able to offer the opportunity to be among the first to visit it.

Based on an overall design by leading landscape architect Tom Stuart-Smith, this once in a generation project will include one of the largest walled gardens in the UK, beautifully landscaped grounds, living plant collections and horticultural trails.

We will also take the opportunity to visit some of the best gardens in the North West, including Trentham Estate in Staffordshire, where the contemporary revival of the famous Italian Gardens was also led by Tom Stuart-Smith; Dunham Massey, a great plantsman's garden; and Arley Hall, whose pair of herbaceous borders is one of the great garden sights of England.





Your Itinerary

Day 1 We depart from our pick-up points and head for the gardens of Trentham **Estate** in Staffordshire. The contemporary revival of the famous Italian Gardens was led by renowned designer and multiple-Chelsea gold medal winner Tom Stuart-Smith. To the east of the Italian Gardens are the Rivers of Grass and the adjacent Floral Labyrinth. Both these schemes were designed by eminent Dutch plantsman and Chelsea gold medal winner, Piet Oudolf. At the centre of Trentham Gardens is the mile long, Capability Brown designed Trentham Lake. Take the circular lakeside walk all the way round as it takes you beside the River Trent, by the bird hide, through Capability Brown's cascading weir and along atmospheric woodland trails. The show gardens offer further inspiration to gardeners on a more domestic scale. (D)

Day 2 We depart for the brand new RHS Garden Bridgewater at Worsley. This once in a generation project has seen the Royal Horticultural Society take inspiration from the heritage of the site and transform it into a world-class garden. Based on an overall design by leading landscape architect Tom Stuart-Smith, highlights will include one of the largest walled gardens in the UK, beautifully landscaped grounds, living plant collections and horticultural trials.

In the afternoon, we visit a nearby **private garden**, which, in contrast to Bridgewater, is much smaller but no less intriguing. As featured on BBC TV's Gardeners' World, this is a two-acre water garden with ponds, streams, waterfalls, islands and a lake. There is a good variety of trees, plants and climbers and the garden is a haven for local waterfowl. (B & D)

Day 3 This morning we visit the gardens at **Dunham Massey**. Previously a garden of straight lines and regimented planting, the garden became the family's pleasure ground under the 5th Earl of Stamford and Warrington, when sweeping lawns and meandering paths were introduced. Dunham Massey was taken over by the National Trust in 1976 and work began to transform the garden to its former glory. It was decided that the garden would have an Edwardian feel with the freedom to choose from a range of planting options, with native favourites alongside exotic treasures. The garden continues to evolve today - modern additions include the Rose Garden and the Winter Garden.

Later we visit **Tatton Park**, whose gardens have developed over 200 years yet retain much of their Edwardian character. Lewis William Wyatt and Joseph Paxton designed various elements including the Conservatory. Other features include a vegetable garden used for growing varieties typical of the Edwardian era and a fine representation of a Japanese garden, thought to be the result of Alan de Tatton's visit to the Anglo-Japanese Exhibition at the White City in London in 1910. (B & D)



Day 4 We depart for a visit to **Arley Hall**. A pair of herbaceous borders was laid out here in 1846 and they survive to this day, beautifully maintained - one of the great garden sights of England. There are also old walled gardens with good mixed borders and a simple terraced walk above a ha-ha. Still in private hands, Arley Hall preserves the atmosphere of a garden kept for its own delight.

Following our visit we return to our original departure points. (B)

WALMER CASTLE

AND THE CINQUE PORTS

The historic pleasure gardens at Walmer Castle in Kent have been dramatically brought back to life thanks to a £2.3m restoration project funded by English Heritage, and they form the centrepiece of this new tour, which also visits the 'Cinque Ports' of Hastings, Sandwich, Hythe, Dover and Romney.

Later we call in at **Winchester Cathedral** to pay our respects at the grave of Jane Austen and follow in the footsteps of the Romantic poet **John Keats**, who spent some time here. (B & D)

Day 3 Travelling into Sussex we visit Monk's House, the tranquil 16th-century cottage where novelist Virginia Woolf lived and entertained the 'Bloomsbury Group', and Bateman's, the Jacobean House which was the home of Rudyard Kipling. (B)

HISTORIC HOUSES OF DORSET

The county of Dorset is a rich repository of historic houses, with many properties recorded in the Domesday Book of 1086. Each one has a multitude of stories to tell, some having changed hands many times, others having been home to the same family for centuries. HISTORIC HOUSES OF ABERDEENSHIRE

A berdeenshire is dotted with historic houses and castles, many of them outstanding examples of Scots Baronial architecture. Each one has a fascinating story to tell with countless legends and several royal connections.

Our tour starts with a bang at Drum Castle, where 700 years of history is woven into its battlements. Haddo House showcases the crisp Neo-Classical style of William Adam, while Fyvie Castle represents a prime example of the more extravagant Scots Baronial form.

Castle Fraser is the most elaborate Z-plan castle in Scotland, while Craigievar seems simply to have grown naturally out of the rolling hills. The Queen's traditional late summer residence of Balmoral Castle is the most modern property we visit, though no less fascinating, and we conclude at glorious Crathes Castle.

Day 1 We begin at **Drum Castle and Gardens**. The sweep of 700 years of history is stamped into Drum's stalwart battlements, medieval square tower and sprawling extensions. The beautiful Garden of Historic Roses is divided into quadrants that show how roses have been cultivated from the 17th to the 20th century and an ancient oak forest adjoins the castle. (D)

Day 2 Our first visit of the day is to **Haddo House**. Unusual for Aberdeenshire in that it is not a castle, the house elegantly blends crisp Georgian architecture with sumptuous late Victorian interiors. Later we visit the magnificent fortress of **Fyvie Castle** with ghosts, legends and folklore woven into its 800-year history. ($\mathbb{B} \& \mathbb{D}$)

Day 3 We start at **Castle Fraser**, one of the grandest of the Scottish baronial tower houses, with a strikingly simple Great Hall. Next is **Craigievar Castle**, whose great tower stands just as it did when completed in 1626, and we round off the day at **Balmoral**, which needs little introduction as a favourite royal residence. Built around 1854 for Queen Victoria and Prince Albert, it is relatively modern though clearly in the style of a 'Scottish' castle. ($\mathbb{B} \& \mathbb{D}$)

Day 4 We conclude at **Crathes Castle**, set against a backdrop of rolling hills and within its own glorious gardens. Crathes is every inch the classic Scottish tower house, with a labyrinth of cultural and family history. We then return to our original pick-up points. (B)

HISTORIC HOUSES OF THE

he Scottish Borders are often overlooked in comparison with the £695 Highlands and Islands, whose grandeur and drama have an obvious attraction. Yet the Borders have a quiet, understated beauty of their own, with softly rolling hills draped in early morning mist, peaceful valleys dotted with sheep farms, and the sinuous, salmon-filled River Tweed, which runs like a silver thread from the Lowther Hills down to the sea at Berwick.

This prosperous region is also home to a remarkable number of historic houses including Manderston House, described as "the swansong of the stately home"; Traquair House, the oldest continuously inhabited house in Scotland; and Abbotsford, home to Sir Walter Scott. Perhaps the grandest of all is Floors Castle, the magnificent home of the Duke of Roxburghe.

Day 1 We drive into the Scottish Borders for our visit to Manderston House, built in the finest Georgian country house style in the 1790s. The mansion was rebuilt in the early 20th century, and when the architect asked how much he could spend, he was told that "it simply doesn't matter." (D)

Day 2 Travel through Tweeddale to Abbotsford House, built by Sir Walter Scott following the success of his great novels. In the afternoon we visit **Traquair House**, which is said to be the oldest continuously inhabited house in Scotland. (B & D)

Day 3 This morning we visit Mellerstain **House**, one of Scotland's great Georgian houses. We move on to Floors Castle, home of the Duke & Duchess of Roxburghe, a romantic fairytale castle with a roofscape of turrets, pinnacles and cupolas. (B & D)

Day 4 We conclude at Thirlestane Castle, a magnificent 16th century castle set in a quiet meadow landscape. The family home of the Duke of Lauderdale. Thirlestane Castle is one of the oldest and finest castles in Scotland, and dates back to at least the 12th century. Lunch is provided in the authentic Victorian Kitchen here. (B & L)

CASTLES & HOUSES OF NORTHUMBERLAND

A visit to the low lying coast and wide open spaces of
Northumberland is always a treat, but when it includes a host of
historic houses and castles the pleasure is magnified greatly. Perhaps
the most impressive of these is Bamburgh Castle, which sprawls over
a rocky plateau on the coast, close to the Farne Islands. Late in its long life it
was bought by the visionary inventor and philanthropist Lord Armstrong, whose
innovative house at Cragside we will also visit.

Further highlights include a trip to the holy island of Lindisfarne and visits to both the castle and priory; a visit to Belsay Hall, built in 19th century Greek revival style from stone carved from its own quarry which was later transformed into a unique garden; and Wallington House, which dates back to 1688 and also boasts a fine garden. Then there is Alnwick Castle, which has been described as the 'Windsor of the North' and is the second largest inhabited castle in England. For once, we will spend more time in the castle than in the neighbouring garden, but it would be remiss not to visit this most inspiring of projects.



Day 1 We depart from London King's Cross by train for Newcastle and continue to the house and gardens of **Belsay Hall**, a classical brown stone mansion, built in the 19th century in Greek revival style to the design of its owner, Sir Charles Monck. (D)

Day 2 We travel north along the dramatic Northumberland coast to **Bamburgh Castle**, an impressive fortress that has stood here for over 1400 years. Nearby lies the Holy Island of **Lindisfarne**, where we will visit both the 16th century castle, converted to a private house by Lutyens, and the **Priory**, one of the most important centres of early Christianity. (B & D)

Day 3 This morning we visit Alnwick Castle, the historic home of the Duke of Northumberland, described as the 'Windsor of the North' and the second largest inhabited castle in England, along with the neighbouring Alnwick Garden. Later we explore Cragside House, which has the appearance of something from a Grimms' fairytale but when built in 1870 was crammed with the latest gadgets. (B & D)

Day 4 We conclude at Wallington House which dates back to 1688 and was home to many generations of the Blackett and Trevelyn families, all of whom have left their legacy behind. (\mathbb{B})

CASTLES & HOUSES OF LINCOLNSHIRE

he county of Lincolnshire is littered with historic halls, mansions and castles. From our comfortable base on the outskirts of the cathedral city of Lincoln we tour the county and sample the delights of one fine property after another.

Our first port of call is Belton Hall, often cited as the perfect example of an English country house estate with a fine collection of porcelain and silver. Rising from the flat Lincolnshire fens is Tattershall House, built to be a statement of power and wealth and one of the finest examples of medieval brickwork, while at the foot of the wolds lies Gunby Hall, a homely country house with a fine garden. Doddington Hall also boasts notable gardens as well as a fascinating collection of furniture and other items accumulated over 400 years. Following our visit here, we spend the afternoon in Lincoln itself, visiting both the castle and the cathedral, both oozing with history. We round off in style with a visit to the impressive Grimsthorpe Castle, where we enjoy a private tour of the castle followed by time to explore the intricate gardens, thought to date back to at least 1500.

WALKING IN CORNWALL

Brightwater Holidays holds ATOL number 4498 issued by the Civil Aviation Authority. For all other packages, The Association of Bonded Travel Organisers Trust Limited (ABTOT) provides financial protection under The Package Travel and Linked Travel Arrangements Regulations 2018.

1. BOOKING

All information provided in the brochure/website is, to the best of our knowledge or belief, correct at the time of publication. We will advise you of any changes that are fundamental to the contract, or which we believe will affect your enjoyment of the holiday. Please advise us if there is any requirement, which you believe is fundamental to your holiday so that we can give you the latest information at time of booking.

When you ask us to proceed with a booking you will be required to make a (minimum) deposit payment which will vary dependent on the specific holiday you are booking. This will be advised at the time of booking and confirmed in your booking confirmation. It may also be necessary to collect payment at the time of booking for other (non-refundable) costs e.g. flight tickets, transfers etc. In the case of bookings made after the balance due date, we will require full payment for the holiday.

You must be at least 18 years old to make a booking and you guarantee that you have the authority to accept, and do accept, these terms and conditions for all members of the party (including anyone who is added or substituted at a later date), and in particular payment for all the persons on the booking. We reserve the right in our absolute discretion to refuse to accept any booking without necessarily specifying a reason.

A contract is made when we accept your booking and issue our written booking confirmation/invoice. If we cannot accept or confirm the booking, any money paid will be promptly refunded. On receipt of the booking confirmation/invoice it is important to check the details and if there is any inaccuracy this must be notified to us immediately. It may not be possible to make changes or corrections later, or additional costs may be incurred which we will have to pass on to you.

Many of our holidays are based on specially negotiated airfares booked in a specific airline booking class. At the time of booking if these fares are not available, we will endeavour to secure an alternative air fare and advise you of any additional cost. Please note that most special air fares are non-refundable and non-changeable.

2. PAYMENT

We hold your deposit (and any additional payment required at the time of booking) towards the full cost of the holiday. The balance must be received by us no later than the final payment due date shown on your booking confirmation/invoice, as appropriate to your holiday. If you do not pay the full cost within the time specified we may treat your holiday as cancelled by you in which case the cancellation charges shown in point 4 - Cancellation by You, will apply.

Deposit Payments:

UK Guests: £100 for holidays without flights, £200 for UK/Europe holidays with flights, 10% for long-haul holidays.

US Guests: \$135 for holidays without flights, \$270 for UK/Europe holidays with flights, 10% for long-haul holidays.

Deposit for all Lord of the Glens cruises is 35% of the total price.

You must pay the balance in full ten weeks prior to departure (twenty weeks for cruises) unless otherwise stipulated.

Flexible balance payment dates: As part of our Covid-19 policy, we will never take a balance payment from you if we know that a tour is unlikely to go ahead as a result of Covid-19 presence or restrictions. In those circumstances, we will flex the balance payment date later until we are confident that the tour can be safely operated.

Ways to Pay - we accept payment by Visa, MasterCard, cheque or bank transfer for which no levy is charged by us. Your bank or credit card provider may charge an additional financial processing charge and we cannot be responsible for any such charges. (Please note: if you are paying from an overseas bank account you have to accept all bank charges). A surcharge of 2.5% will be applied for card payments made with cards registered in countries outside the EEA and the USA.

3. YOUR HOLIDAY PRICE

- a) Prior to booking you will receive a verbal quote based on your specific holiday requirements and travel dates.
- b) We reserve the right to notify you of any alteration in the advertised or quoted price and any changes in holiday arrangements before accepting your booking.

Note: We make every effort to ensure that the most up to date and correct prices are shown on our website. We operate a pricing policy which means that the earlier you book the cheaper the holiday will be. Our very best prices are reserved for those who book early. We also commit that we will not offer the same holiday at a lower price to anyone that has booked after you (or we will refund you the difference between your price and the price they pay). If you do not wish to accept the corrected and actual price of the holiday, we will cancel the booking and provide a full refund of any monies you have already paid. Alternatively, you may amend your booking or select an alternative holiday at the applicable and correct price.

- c) Subject to these conditions, once we have confirmed your booking, the price is fully guaranteed and will not be subject to any additional 'surcharges', which means any increase due to changes in the price of the carriage of passengers resulting from changes to the cost of fuel or other power sources, the level of taxes or fees imposed by third parties, including tourist taxes, landing taxes or embarkation or disembarkation fees at port and airports or exchange rates.
- d) Prices in our brochures and/or on our website are calculated on rates of exchange linked to those available to us; either based on rates previously secured or our view of currency exchange rates applicable at the time payments are due.
- e) From time to time we offer discounts and special offers on the price of the holiday. Please note that only one discount or special offer can be applied to any holiday at one time and multiple discounts cannot be applied.

Single, Double, Twin Bedded Rooms

Single supplements are payable for sole occupancy of a room. A single room does not guarantee the provision of a double or twin room, and in some instances may be smaller. A 'double' bed is often two single beds pushed together, sometimes with double bed base linen (although it is not unusual for single duvets to be provided in some hotels for doubles).

4. CANCELLATION & VARIATION BY YOU

Cancellation by You:

If you or any member of your party wish to cancel your holiday, or if you fail to pay the full cost of the holiday within the specified time you will be liable, as a minimum, to pay the charges detailed below up to the point of cancellation, in addition to any non-refundable items*. Or in the case of failure to pay, at the date that we deem your booking to have been cancelled. Written notification from the person who made the booking must be received at our offices. The cancellation charge will be calculated according to the date this is received, or the date upon which your cancellation is treated as occurring because of non-payment.

*Non-refundable holiday costs charged including upgraded air tickets, hotel upgrades, extensions, extra nights, transfers etc., will be charged at 100% and the charges shown below will then apply to the remainder of the holiday cost and any amendment charges are not refundable. Additional accommodation costs for reduced occupancy or other components, may be payable in the event that one or more passengers cancels but where remaining passengers still wish to travel.

Group Bookings - cancellation charges will apply to any guests in the group who may wish to cancel in the unlikely event of cancellation by the lead passenger.

Note: If your cancellation falls within the provisions of your travel insurance policy you may be able to make a claim which must be made direct to your insurance company.

Cancellation Charges - if you cancel your holiday:

In order to compensate our expenditure, we charge a cancellation fee according to the following scale:

2021 Tours: Up to 56 days: deposit and any invoiced flight or hotel costs | 55-41 days: 35% and any invoiced flight or hotel costs | 40-29 days: 55% and any invoiced flight or hotel costs | 28-8 days: 75% and any invoiced flight or hotel costs | 7-0 days: 100% and any invoiced flight or hotel costs

2022 Tours: Up to 70 days: deposit and any invoiced flight or hotel costs | 69-41 days: 35% and any invoiced flight or hotel costs | 40-29 days: 55% and any invoiced flight or hotel costs | 28-8 days: 75% and any invoiced flight or hotel costs | 7-0 days: 100% and any invoiced flight or hotel costs

Lord of the Glens: Up to 113 days: deposit and any invoiced flight or hotel costs | 112-0 days: 100% and any invoiced flight or hotel costs

Covid-19 cancellation: We strongly recommend insurance cover for pre-departure cancellation and return from tour in the event of Covid-19 symptoms. However, if you are not able to claim for pre-tour cancellation for Covid-19, we will endeavour to limit cancellation charges to cover only those service costs which we are unable to recover.

The cancellation charges will apply from the day we receive confirmation. You may make a claim on your Holiday Insurance if the reason for the cancellation falls within the terms of the insurance policy.

We will observe travel advice provided by the UK Foreign & Commonwealth Office. Should circumstances dictate, we may have to cancel your booking if the performance of your holiday, or the carriage of passengers to your destination is significantly affected by unavoidable and extraordinary circumstances. In such circumstances, we will arrange for your booking to be cancelled and for you to receive a full refund.

Variation by You:

Booking alterations: If, after our booking confirmation/invoice has been issued, you wish to change your travel arrangements in any way, for example your chosen departure date or accommodation, we will do our utmost to make these changes (subject to agreement by our suppliers) but it may not always be possible. Any request for changes to be made must be received at our offices. This can be by phone, or in writing, either by email or letter from the person who made the booking. You will be asked to pay an administration charge starting from £50 per person in addition to any associated costs of the changes imposed by our suppliers and any extra arrangements, these costs are non-refundable. Quotes normally have a 24 hour time frame before they expire and the price is therefore subject to change. You should be aware that these costs could increase as the departure dates becomes closer and you should contact us as soon as possible. Additional fees may be charged, depending on the cost and work caused to us by the requested change.

Booking transfer to another person: You can transfer your existing booking to another person suggested by you (subject to agreement by our suppliers).* Notice must be received at our offices, by phone, by email or by letter, from the person who made the booking at least 25 days before departure. The replacement traveller must satisfy and fulfil any conditions that apply to the holiday, and all costs of the original booking, and both you and the new traveller are responsible for paying all costs we incur before the transfer can be made by us. The cost of the transfer will consist of both an administration charge of £50 and any costs which our suppliers impose.

* If you are unable to travel, you may wish to check whether cover is provided for your cancellation within the terms of your travel insurance policy as this may incur less cost to you.

Note: Certain travel arrangements may not be transferrable after a reservation has been made, for example, some airlines may require payment of 100% cancellation charges and the cost of a new ticket for ANY variation that is made, and changes to other arrangements may incur a cancellation charge of up to 100%.

Booking transfer to an alternative holiday: It may be possible at our discretion for you to transfer to another holiday, however this is subject to availability and time frame of departure. You must transfer within 24 hours of notifying Brightwater Holidays and the new departure must be within 1 year of notification. A payment of an administration fee of £50 per person, any associated costs of the change imposed by our suppliers and any extra arrangements (ie flight/room upgrades) will be payable by you.

While on holiday: If you decide to cut short your holiday for your own reasons, or not stay at accommodation that has been booked for you, take any pre-booked meals, excursions or other holiday components, then we are unable to offer you any refund or cover any costs. Depending on the circumstances, your travel insurance may offer cover for such curtailment, so we suggest that you check the conditions and requirements of your policy.

5. CANCELLATION & VARIATION BY US

We start planning the holidays we offer many months in advance. Occasionally, we have to make changes to and correct errors and other details both before and after bookings have been confirmed or cancel confirmed bookings, events or activities. Holidays to remote and in some cases, underdeveloped parts of the world carry the risk that parts of the holiday may be subject to alterations beyond our control, sometimes at short notice. Whilst we always endeavour to avoid changes and cancellations, we must reserve the right to do so.

Cancellation by Us:

We reserve the right to cancel your booking. We will not cancel your confirmed booking after the final 'balance due' payment date, except for unavoidable and extraordinary circumstances (see point 6) or failure by you to pay the final balance of your holiday.

Minimum Numbers - some of our holidays require a minimum number of participants to enable us to operate them. If the minimum number of bookings required for a particular holiday or flight have not been received, we are entitled to cancel it and will notify you prior to the final 'balance due' payment date. Please note that in such cases we are not able to accept responsibility for any costs you may have incurred, including costs of other travel arrangements made in association with the cancelled holiday, unless booked through Brightwater Holidays.

We are happy to give you an indication at any time of the current number of passengers booked on a trip, but this should not be taken as any guarantee whether the holiday will or will not go ahead as booking numbers can fluctuate. There may be certain circumstances when a holiday may operate with less than the minimum number than the advertised group size.

If your holiday is cancelled you can either have a refund of all monies paid or accept an alternative holiday of comparable standard from us if we offer one (we will refund any price difference if the alternative is of a lower value).

In the event a refund is paid to you, we will compensate you for reasonable, non-refundable costs (eg flight tickets) which you have incurred, to be mutually agreed on a case-by-case basis.

Cancellation as a result of Global Travel Disruption

If it becomes necessary to cancel your tour as a result of global travel disruption, we reserve the right to refund the cost of your tour in the form of credit for a limited amount of time, to be used against any other tour in the Specialist Journeys portfolio. If you do not use this credit within that time, a refund would be payable. This change to the standard booking conditions would only apply if approved by the UK Government and enshrined in the Package Travel and Linked Travel Arrangements Regulations (PTRs) as an emergency measure to support tour operators in extraordinary circumstances such as the 2020 Covid-19 outbreak. The exact credit terms and timeframe would be defined by the PTRs.

Variation by Us:

It is a term of your booking that we are able to make changes to any aspect of your booking. If the change is insignificant, we will ensure that you are notified about it. Examples of insignificant changes include a change of airline or aircraft type, alteration of your outward/return flights by less than 12 hours, change of airports and/or local connecting transport, Tour Manager and changes to supplementary arrangements such as site visit, or change of accommodation to another of the same or higher standard.

Occasionally, we may have to make a significant change. If we are constrained by circumstances beyond our control to alter significantly any of the main characteristics of the travel services that make up your package, you will have rights set out below.

- We will contact you and you will have the choice of accepting the change or having a refund of all monies paid. You can also accept an alternative holiday, where we offer one (we will refund any price difference if the alternative is of lower value) or purchase an alternative holiday subject to availability and applicable cost. We will tell you the procedure for making your choice. Please read any notification of changes carefully and respond promptly as if you do not respond to us within the timescale given, your booking may be cancelled.
- If you choose to accept a refund, we will compensate you for reasonable, non-refundable costs (eg flight tickets) which you have incurred, to be mutually agreed on a case-by-case basis.

Very rarely, we may be forced by 'circumstances beyond our control' (see point 6) to change or terminate your holiday after departure but before the scheduled end of your time away. This is extremely rare, if this situation does occur, we regret we will be unable to make any refunds (unless we obtain these from our suppliers), pay you any compensation or meet any costs or expenses you incur as a result.

We do not control the day to day management of your accommodation, and in exceptional cases it is possible that we may be advised that the reserved accommodation has been overbooked. If this happens before your departure or on arrival in a location, we will endeavour to provide accommodation of at least the same standard in the same area. If only accommodation of a lower standard is available we will refund the difference of the holiday price between the accommodation booked and that available, and will pay up to £50 per person for any inconvenience.

6. CIRCUMSTANCES BEYOND OUR CONTROL

Except where otherwise expressly stated in these booking conditions, we regret we cannot accept liability or pay any compensation, reimburse expenses, or cover losses where the performance of our obligations under our contract with you is prevented or affected by, or you otherwise suffer any damage, loss or expense of any nature as a result of 'circumstances beyond our control'. In these booking conditions, 'circumstances beyond our control' means any event which we or the supplier of the service(s) in question could not, even with all due care, foresee or avoid. Such events may include actual or threatened war, riot, civil strife, terrorist activity and its consequences (including suspected terrorist activity and all action taken during any "terror alert"), industrial dispute, natural or nuclear disaster, adverse weather conditions, epidemics and pandemics, unavoidable technical problems with transport, airport or airspace closures, as well as other air traffic management decisions (that may result in long or overnight delays or cancellations), fire, concert/event changes or cancellation and all similar events outside our control. This list is not exhaustive. BREXIT – at this current time and until negotiations are completed and full details known, it is not possible to foresee any impact, changes or restrictions there may be on flight operations between the EU and the UK or the effect this may have on booked holiday arrangements.

Group based holidays and activities - worldwide weather patterns are becoming ever more erratic and unpredictable. If it is not possible to operate certain excursions for this reason, we will endeavour to offer alternatives if this is possible. Such circumstances are totally beyond our control and you therefore should proceed with your booking on this basis.

Public Holidays, Sporting & Local Events - in addition to public holidays, many countries host other national or international events or there may be local festivals, which may impact on local/tourist services or travel arrangements, including the reduction or closure of facilities, route diversions etc. during your visit. We have no control over these events, and as dates and details of arrangements are often changeable year on year, it is not possible for us to guarantee to forewarn you of specific details that may be relevant to your holiday, or accept any responsibility for disruption that may be caused. During public holidays, shops, restaurants and tourist attractions may also be closed.

Third-Party Information & Websites - your booking is based on the information supplied to you by Brightwater Holidays. We understand you may conduct additional research into your holiday through other third parties and associated websites, but as we have no control over such information this does not form any basis of our contract with you.

Wi-Fi - where the provision of Wi-Fi may be indicated in a property description, no guarantee is given or implied that it will be operative during your holiday and its availability is outside our control. Some properties may charge for this service and the areas where it is available may be limited and not necessarily available in guest rooms. In all cases, no compensation or refund will be paid in the event that it is not available for whatever reason.

Dietary Requests & Allergies - even nowadays, in some destinations, basic well-known dietary requirements (such as vegetarian, gluten free etc.) are often misunderstood and seldom catered for adequately, despite the best intentions and assurances from hoteliers and restaurateurs. While we are happy to pass on any such requests, we cannot guarantee choice or availability - especially with any airline meal options. We cannot accept detailed lists of specific dietary or food preparation requests and are unable to accept any other requests (eg. personal preferences) that are not for medical or religious reasons. Note: Whilst on holiday it is your responsibility to double check and reconfirm any allergy or dietary requirements directly with the various holiday suppliers.

Other Hotel Guests - it is not unusual for hotels or other accommodation to receive group bookings (sometimes with large numbers) from guests participating in conventions and conferences or other gatherings. At certain times of the year, there may be an influx of groups such as students on organised educational visits (popular during school holidays), associations or clubs. This may result in hotel facilities being much busier than usual or additional demands on hotel staff and services, but we are unable to accept any responsibility for any inconvenience caused by such groups or their activities.

Guides - we reserve the right to substitute any named guide, guest lecturer or other escort with an alternative qualified person and this will not be deemed as any significant change to your arrangements.

7. FOREIGN & COMMONWEALTH TRAVEL ADVICE, HEALTH, VISAS & DOCUMENTS

- a) Your specific passport and visa requirements, and other immigration requirements including, inoculations and health certificates are your responsibility and you should confirm these for all countries to, or through which you are intending to travel and cover all costs for this. Requirements should be checked well in advance of travel and we do not accept any responsibility if you cannot travel because you have not complied with any passport, visa or immigration requirements.
- b) Essential information for British citizens (only), including health, passport and visa requirements along with up to date Foreign Office travel, safety and security advice can be obtained from https://www.gov.uk/travelaware. We also strongly recommend that you sign up for the latest email updates as travel and safety information can change at any point without notice.
- c) If you or any member of your party is not a British citizen or holds a non-British passport, you must check passport and visa requirements with the Embassy or Consulate of the country or countries to, or through which, you are intending to travel and consult the relevant authority for the latest travel and safety advice for the destinations you are visiting.
- d) We recommend that you consult your doctor well in advance of travel for the latest advice on inoculations and health certificates. You can also obtain the latest health information ahead of travel by visiting the National Travel Health Network and Centre (NaTHNac) website https://www.travelhealthpro.org.uk.

8. SPECIAL CIRCUMSTANCES

Our holidays are not designed for party members to undertake special projects or research whether in connection with study, employment or otherwise. We cannot accept any liability for any losses or damages arising out of such use or planned use nor for any loss or damage which has special financial consequences. Please note if you do intend to use one of our holidays for such purposes you should obtain adequate insurance in respect of it and any special equipment you decide to bring with you on such holidays.

9. HOLIDAY PARTICIPATION

It is a condition of participation on our holidays that you agree to accept the authority and decisions of our employees, tour leaders and agents whilst on holiday with us. If in the opinion of such a person your health or conduct at any time, before or after departure, appears likely to endanger the safe, comfortable or happy progress of a holiday, you may be excluded from all or part of the holiday and/or we may terminate your holiday, and any additional costs incurred by you as a result of such exclusion will be your responsibility. In the case of ill health, we may make such arrangements as we see fit and recover any resulting costs from you.

Note: While there are no age limits or health requirements on our holidays, please note that for certain destinations, for example the smaller Scottish islands or some botanical tours, a degree of mobility is required to get the most out of the holiday, for example getting in and out of boats, ascending/descending steps and standing for a degree of time.

10. OUR LIABILITY TO YOU

We make every effort to ensure that the holiday arrangements we have agreed to provide as part of our contract with you are delivered with reasonable skill and care. It is the laws and regulations of the country in which the services are actually provided which apply to your holiday arrangements and not those of the UK or your home country and any resulting complaint or claim will be judged on this basis. If the particular services which gave rise to the claim or complaint complied with local laws and regulations applicable to those services at the time, the services will be treated as being properly provided. Please note, it is your responsibility to show that reasonable skill and care have not been used if you wish to make a claim against us. In addition, we will only be responsible for what our employees, agents and suppliers do or do not do if they were at the time acting within the course of their employment (for employees) or carrying out work we had asked them to do (for agents and suppliers). Also bear in mind that standards of, for example, safety, hygiene, and quality may vary and services and transport your holiday involves may differ to the stringent standards we are accustomed to in the UK or your home country. Including for example, the absence of seatbelts on coaches contracted outside the UK as this is not always a legal requirement elsewhere.

Certain holidays involve risks and hazards of travel to and in remote and/or uninhabited areas where injury, illness, death, delay, or unanticipated events may occur as a result of forces of nature, wildlife and adverse weather conditions. Medical services or facilities may not be readily available or accessible in some parts, and the medical facilities that do exist could be of inferior quality compared to what is available at home. In remote regions risks may include but are not limited to: mechanical breakdown of expedition vehicle(s); becoming stranded in remote and/or uninhabited areas; being subjected to rugged terrain and a harsh climate; encounters with wild animals, insects and pests, and the possibility of illness, injury or death there-from; the uncontrollable and unpredictable behaviour of wild animals in their natural habitat; the possibility of not seeing certain animals; and dangerous weather and climate conditions.

You must inform us without undue delay of any failure to perform or improper performance of the travel services included in this package. If any of the travel services included in your package are not performed in accordance with the contract, or improperly performed, by us or the travel service suppliers, and this has affected the enjoyment of your travel arrangements, you may be entitled to an appropriate price reduction or compensation or both. We will not be liable where any failure to perform or improper performance of the travel services is due to: you or another member of your party; or a third party unconnected with the provision of the travel services in the package and is unforeseeable or unavoidable.

Our liability, except in cases involving death, injury or illness, shall be limited to a maximum of three times the cost of your travel arrangements (excluding amendment charges). Our liability (if we are found liable to you on any basis) will also be limited in accordance with and/or in an identical manner to:

a) The contractual terms of the companies that provide the travel services that made up your package.

These terms are incorporated into this booking contract; and

b) Any relevant international convention, for example the Montreal Convention in respect of travel by air, the Athens Convention in respect of travel by sea, the Berne Convention in respect of travel by rail and the Paris Convention in respect of the provision of accommodation, which limit the amount of and conditions under which compensation can be claimed for death, injury, delay to passengers and loss, damage and delay to luggage (there are strict Conditions of Carriage obligations for making claims for missing or damaged baggage that must be followed). We are regarded as having all benefit of any limitation of the extent of or the conditions under which compensation is to be paid under these or any conventions.

You can ask for copies of the travel service contractual terms, or the international conventions, from Brightwater Holidays.

Where a carrier or hotelier would not be obliged to make any payment to you under the applicable international convention or regulation in respect of a claim or part of a claim, we similarly are not obliged to make a payment to you for that claim or part of the claim.

Under EU law (Regulation 261/2004) you have rights in some circumstances to refunds and/or compensation from your airline in cases of denied boarding, cancellation or delay to flights – see point 11 below.

If it is impossible to ensure your return as scheduled due to unavoidable and extraordinary circumstances, we will bear the cost of necessary accommodation, if possible, of equivalent category, for a maximum of three nights if this is not provided by your airline, in accordance with Regulation 261/2004. The limit doesn't apply to persons with reduced mobility and any person accompanying them, pregnant women and unaccompanied minors, or persons in need of specific medical assistance, provided that you notified us of these needs at least 48 hours before the start of your holiday.

Note: this entire clause does not apply to any services which do not form part of your contract with us i.e. 'own arrangements'. This includes for example, any additional services, including excursions, that you organise independently, or services which your hotel or any other supplier agrees to provide for you where these are not organised by us as part of our contract with you. We recommend that sufficient and appropriate insurance is taken out. In addition, we cannot accept any liability for any damage, loss, expense or other sum(s) of any description (1) which on the basis of the information given to us by you concerning your booking prior to our accepting it, we could not have foreseen you would suffer or incur if we breached our contract with you or (2) which did not result from any breach of contract or other fault by ourselves or our employees, or where we are responsible for them, our suppliers or (3) arises out of use of our services for special projects or research whether in connection with study, employment or otherwise or (4) is connected with any business.

We further advise you, and you agree that in the event of any claim against us, that such claim shall be governed by Scottish Law and Jurisdiction shall lie in any Court of Competent Jurisdiction in the United Kingdom and you further acknowledge these requirements and waive any objection(s) thereto.

11. TRAVEL DELAYS & CARRIAGE BY AIR

Should delays due to weather conditions disrupt your itinerary, additional costs may be incurred and these would be the responsibility of you, the client. You will be assisted by the airlines in accordance with the airlines' policy on delay. We cannot accept liability for any delay which is due to any of the reasons set out in point 6 of these booking conditions (which includes the behaviour of any passenger(s) on the flight who, for example, fails to check in or board a flight on time).

Under EU law (Regulation 261/2004) you have rights in some circumstances to refunds and/or compensation from your airline in cases of denied boarding, cancellation or delay to flights. Full details of these rights will be publicised at EU airports and will also be available from airlines. However reimbursement in such cases will not automatically entitle you to a refund of your holiday cost from us. Your right to a refund and/or compensation from us is set out in these booking conditions. If any payments to you are due from us, any payment made to you by the airline will be deducted from this amount. You are required to make any claim under this regulation directly with the airline, but if your airline does not comply with these rules you should complain to the Civil Aviation Authority on 0207 453 6424 https://www.caa.co.uk.

Where long flight delays result in lost holiday time, we are unable to offer any refunds for unused accommodation or other services as reimbursement will not be made by our suppliers in these circumstances, and hotel rooms are held for delayed arrivals and not re-let. We strongly recommend you have adequate insurance provisions in place to fully cover such eventualities.

We are unable to guarantee that all parties will be seated together. With some airlines it is possible to request, or in some cases, reserve certain preferred seats on the aircraft (most airlines will make an additional charge for this). We are happy to assist with this but this is an additional service over and above your contractual arrangement for 'carriage by air' with the airline. Airlines reserve the right to make changes to any specific seat numbers for operational or safety reasons either before, or on the day of departure and you will be notified of any such change upon check-in. Where applicable, any additional charge made for pre-booking specific seats, will be refunded.

In accordance with EU Directive (EC) No 2111/2005 Article 9, we are required to bring to your attention the existence of a "Community list" which contains details of air carriers who are subject to an operating ban within the EU. The Community list is available for inspection at https://ec.europa.eu/transport/modes/air/safety/air- ban_en.

In accordance with EU Regulations we are required to advise you of the actual carrier(s) (or, if the actual carrier(s) is not known, the likely carrier(s)) that will operate your flight(s) at the time of booking. Where we are only able to inform you of the likely carrier(s) at the time of booking, we shall inform you of the identity of the actual carrier(s) as soon as we become aware of this. Any change to the operating carrier(s) after your booking has been confirmed will be notified to you as soon as possible. If the carrier with whom you have a confirmed reservation becomes subject to an operating ban as above as a result of which we/the carrier are unable to offer you a suitable alternative, the provisions of point 5, "Cancellation and Variation by us" will apply.

We are not always in a position at the time of booking to confirm the flight timings, which will be used in connection with your flight. The flight timings shown in our brochure, on our website and/or detailed on your booking confirmation/invoice are for guidance only and are subject to alteration. Flight timings are outside our control. They are set by airlines and are subject to various factors including air traffic control restrictions, weather conditions, potential technical problems and the ability of passengers to check in on time. Specific instructions relating to departure and travel arrangements will be sent with your air or other travel tickets approximately 2 weeks before departure. You must check your tickets very carefully immediately on receipt to ensure you have the correct and up to date flight times. It is possible that flight times may be changed even after tickets have been despatched - we will contact you as soon as possible if this occurs. Any change in the identity of the carrier, flight timings, and/or aircraft type (if advised) will not entitle you to cancel or change to other arrangements without paying our normal charges except where specified in these conditions. We advise that you keep check on your flights departure information on the day of departure in case of any late flight changes.

In accordance with EU legislation, we are required to draw your attention to restrictions concerning the import of food items which cannot be brought into the EU (including the UK), from outside the EU. For details please see http://www2.defra.gov.uk/food/personal-imports/ or contact this office.

12. INSURANCE

It is a condition of booking with us that you and all members of your party obtain travel insurance for all overseas holidays and we strongly recommend insurance cover for all other holidays and that you do not travel against medical advice. The cost of repatriation, medical and other treatment overseas can be high and we are unable to assist in meeting those costs. You should organise it immediately when you book to ensure you have cover against possible cancellation charges, medical treatment and repatriation. Should you have your travel insurance in place we will need to know the details of your policy four weeks before departure at the latest. Brightwater Holidays are authorised to provide travel insurance and we are happy to discuss this when you book. It is a requirement of booking that you provide us with an emergency contact number while you are on holiday stating your relationship (e.g. family member, neighbour, workplace). This is purely for your benefit in the unlikely event of you becoming ill or incapacitated on a holiday.

• We also need to mention - If you choose to take our insurance we ask that you read all sections of the policy document fully. There is a 14 day cooling off period in which you can return the policy for a full refund if it does not meet with your requirements.

13. SPECIAL REQUESTS & MEDICAL CONDITIONS / DISABILITIES

If you or any member of your party have any special requests, you must advise us at the time of booking. Although we will endeavour to pass any reasonable requests on to the relevant supplier, we regret we cannot guarantee any request will be met. Failure to meet any special request will not be a breach of contract on our part. Confirmation that a special request has been noted or passed on to the supplier or the inclusion of the special request on your booking confirmation/invoice or any other documentation is not confirmation that the request will be met. Unless and until specifically confirmed, all special requests are subject to availability. For your own protection, you should obtain confirmation in writing that a special request will be provided (where it is possible to give this) where it is important to you.

We regret we cannot accept any conditional bookings, i.e. any booking which is specified to be conditional on the fulfilment of a particular request. All such bookings will be treated as "standard" bookings subject to the above provisions on special requests.

If you or any member of your party has any medical condition or disability which may affect your holiday or has any special requirements as a result of any medical condition or disability (including any which affect the booking process), you must tell us before you confirm your booking so that we can assist you in considering the suitability of the arrangements and/or making the booking. In any event, you must give us full details in writing at the time of booking and whenever any change in the condition or disability occurs. You must also promptly advise us if any medical condition or disability which may affect your holiday develops or worsens after your booking has been confirmed.

Brightwater Holidays cannot provide individual assistance with boarding coaches or other forms of transport, baggage handling, walking or other personal requirements, etc. and guests should be confident that they can do these tasks unaided. We are happy to give advice and assistance with the choice of your holiday which will be dependent upon the nature of any disability. Our brochures also give a simple guide per holiday regarding how active the holiday is. In order to ensure your enjoyment of the holiday, we ask all clients to provide full details of any disability or special requirements at the time of booking. Some suppliers such as airlines and cruise lines may request certification from your GP to confirm that you are fit to travel. We regret that we cannot be held liable for any costs you may incur as a result.

You are urged to contact our Sales department for further information if you have any difficulty in walking or mobility problems and they will be pleased to advise you on the suitability of any particular holiday.

14. CLIENT BEHAVIOUR

When you book a holiday with Brightwater Holidays you accept responsibility for the proper conduct of you and your party. Brightwater Holidays reserves the right in its reasonable discretion to terminate the holiday of any member of your party whose conduct is disruptive or detrimental to the enjoyment of other clients, or whose conduct may prejudice the reputation of Brightwater Holidays with our suppliers or hotel owners. In that situation Brightwater Holidays shall have no further responsibility or liability to you. The departure of a coach, ship, train, plane or other modes of transport will be not be delayed for passengers who are not on board by the stated boarding time.

15. COMPLAINTS & ASSISTANCE ON HOLIDAY

If you have any reason to be unhappy with any element of your holiday, we would ask you first to bring this to the attention of the person in charge of the relevant service, on the spot. If this is not possible please either contact our local representative or our UK office, using the number provided with your travel documents. It is essential that you do this to enable us to try and put matters right where possible. If a problem remains unresolved during your holiday you should make a complaint which must be received at our offices within 28 days of the completion of your holiday giving your booking reference and all other relevant information. This can be in writing, either by email or letter from the person who made the booking. We will reply to you within 28 days of receipt of your complaint. Please keep your complaint concise and to the point. If you fail to follow the requirement to report your complaint while on holiday we will have been deprived of the opportunity to investigate and rectify it and this may affect your rights under this booking.

If you're in difficulty whilst on holiday and ask us to help, we will provide appropriate assistance, in particular by providing information on health services, local authorities and consular assistance; and helping you to find alternative arrangements and any necessary phone calls/emails. You must pay any costs we incur, if the difficulty is your fault.

The terms of this contract are exclusively governed by Scottish Law and the jurisdiction of the Scottish Courts.

16. PROTECTING YOUR MONEY

We provide full financial protection for our package holidays.

- Flight inclusive holidays: we hold an Air Travel Organiser's Licence issued by the CAA (ATOL No. 4498) which provides for your protection in the event of Brightwater Holidays Ltd insolvency. The price of your air holiday packages includes the ATOL Protection Contribution (APC) we pay to the CAA.
 This charge is included in our advertised prices. When you buy an ATOL protected flight or flight inclusive holiday from us you will receive an ATOL Certificate. This lists what is financially protected, where you can get information on what this means for you and who to contact if things go wrong. Not all holiday or travel services offered and sold by us will be protected by the ATOL scheme as explained below.
- 2. Holidays without flights arranged by us: The Association of Bonded Travel Organisers Trust Limited (ABTOT) provides financial protection under The Package Travel and Linked Travel Arrangements Regulations 2018 for Brightwater Holidays Ltd, and in the event of their insolvency, protection is provided for the following:
 - a) non-flight packages and
 - b) flight inclusive packages that commence outside of the EU, which are sold to customers outside of the EU.

ABTOT cover provides for a refund in the event you have not yet travelled or repatriation if you are abroad. Please note that bookings made outside the EU are only protected by ABTOT when purchased directly with Brightwater Holidays Ltd.

In the unlikely event that you require assistance whilst abroad due to our financial failure, please call the ABTOT 24/7 helpline on 01702 811397 and advise you are a customer of an ABTOT protected travel company.

We must pass the information on to the relevant suppliers of your travel arrangements such as airlines, hotels, transport companies, etc. We will not however, pass any information on to any person not responsible for part of your travel arrangements. This applies to any sensitive information that you give to us such as details of any disabilities, or dietary/religious requirements. In making a booking, you consent to this information being passed on to the relevant persons only.

We may need to disclose personal data to a third party within countries outside the European Economic Area (EEA) for the purpose of providing your holiday. Controls on data protection in your destination may not be as stringent as in the UK. In addition, your data may be disclosed to regulatory bodies or public authorities such as customs or immigration for the purposes of monitoring and/or enforcing compliance with any regulatory rules/codes.

We will only send you information about special offers, brochures, new holidays and competitions if you have 'opted in' to receive news from Brightwater Holidays Ltd. If you do not wish to receive this information, you can use the 'unsubscribe' function at the bottom of any email communication or just let us know.
